**From the Residents**

**Inadequate Park Mowing and Maintenance along the Creek**

The Park Authority (PA) is responsible for mowing the green space along our creek. However, they do not mow close enough to the creek to prevent overgrowth, poison ivy, and invasive vines from taking over during the growing season and the PA does not remove downed trees from the creek bed. This has been an ongoing problem since the creek area was designated a Resource Protection Area (RPA) –(check out p. 7 of the Spring Newsletter to follow the rather tortured history of our park).

Sara would like to create a petition to send to the Providence Supervisor's Office regarding this rather lamentable situation. The argument is threefold. First: the logs, branches and other debris left in the creek cause more extensive flooding for the houses on Custis. Two: the huge tree that fell across the creek several years ago crushed a portion of the creek's retaining wall and has created a real danger for the integrity of the road bed itself. Third: the lack of attention for mowing, especially on the south side of Custis, creates visual safety issues for walkers, bikers, and cars.

What has been especially disturbing for our dedicated group of neighborhood volunteers that try to keep the creek clear of vines and overgrowth is that the Park Authority will no longer pick up our debris piles. We have been instructed not to create them.

You can help with this project by taking pictures of flash flooding, especially when the water comes into your property. Those of us who do not live along the creek don't see it happen. ### **Traffic Issues-Woodlawn Avenue**

A resident on Woodlawn is concerned about the cut-through traffic off Route 29 that zips down to Cavalier to connect to Marshall St. in order to avoid the traffic light, especially when Route 29 is backed up.
