MINUTES OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING
APRIL 19, 1983

Following the reading and approval of the minutes from the prior meeting, President Marianne Gick began discussion of New Business:

RANDY MYERS reported on his attendance at a Fairfax County trails committee meeting. He characterized the meeting as little more than a few disgruntled homeowners arguing with each other over where the WO&D bike path should be located.

He said the group also discussed the bicycle and pedestrian paths which will service the new METRORAIL stops at Falls Church, Vienna and Dunn Loring. Randy said he was willing to attend future meetings of this committee.

JACOB GOODWIN reported that he had spoken with Morris Nunes, the attorney, and encouraged Nunes to expedite the preparation and filing of the association's Incorporation papers. Jacob says that he anticipates no delays from Nunes.

MARIANNE GICK said she had spoken with a representative of the Falls Church Marching Band about a possible financial donation from our association. She informed the Band representative that our association would deal with its request at a later date.

MARIANNE GICK gave a brief progress report on the Association's upcoming Membership drive.

JACOB GOODWIN reported on developments affecting the new part at the Woodlawn end of Custis Parkway. He mentioned that County authorities had indicated the possibility that the barricades around the park at that end of Custis might have to be metal, rather than wooden, due to Virginia State Highway Commission regulations. Jacob said he would attend a meeting of County officials to discuss the issue further.

RANDY MYERS and SUSAN HOWLETT volunteered to work with PAT MASTROLEO in selecting a CITIZEN OF THE YEAR.

MARTY SAUERS is said to be planning a cleanup project on the creek the weekend prior to the June 40th Birthday Party.

MARIANNE GICK asked if any member of the Board of Directors was interested in attending a meeting of the Parks Commission to discuss development options affecting the Pinecrest Golf Course. No one expressed any interest in attending.

JACOB GOODWIN made a motion to reimburse Pat Mastroleo \$40 to cover the costs of computer disks, computer paper and

related supplies. The motion was seconded by Carl Kappapel and passed 7-0. ~~Later votes in favor of the motion were by Henry Rodriguez, Postmaster, Jon Nelson & Seth Blecher~~
A suggestion was made to amend the association's By-Laws to define a Quorum as 10 members at a general meeting of the association's membership and 50% plus one of the voting members at an Executive Board meeting.

JACOB GOODWIN raised possibility of asking U.S. Post Office to place a post box somewhere in Greenway Downs neighborhood to eliminate need to walk across Lee Highway to reach one. He offered to contact Post Office for further information.

SUSAN HOWLETT moved that the meeting be adjourned at 10:05 p.m.. RANDY MYERS seconded the motion and it was approved unanimously.

Minutes of May 20, 1983 Meeting
Greenway Downs Citizens Association, Inc.

Following a successful pot luck dinner and awards presentation, President Marianne Siek called the meeting to order. A quorum was present. The minutes were read and approved with one addition. During the reading of the Treasurer's report, the members learned that the balance in the Association's account is \$1547.77

Discussion then was directed to unfinished business. The first topic was to put to a vote of the general membership the proposed changes in the Association's by-laws. These proposals were published in the April 1983 "DOWNS". All changes were passed unanimously.

The second matter of unfinished business was the request by the Falls Church High School Board for a donation to pay for replacement uniforms. Randy Taylor pointed out that the board's goal had been surpassed. Because of this a motion was made by Mike Ains and seconded by Michael Siek to defer any contribution until such time when funds were again needed for uniforms. The motion passed unanimously.

The last topic of unfinished business concerned the membership drive. Membership Drive Chairman Marianne Siek stated that the drive was near completion though she doubted 100% coverage. Several volunteers expressed uncertainty whether they would be able to complete the job. Complete details of the drive will be reported at a later date.

The issue of a fence/barricade around portions of Greenway Downs Park were discussed next. Jacob Goodwin made a presentation showing the possible locations. He stated that due to low ~~the bid budget~~ for the lot lot Construction the County had surplus funds available for the park. They were willing to spend the funds on approximately 1000 feet of fencing around the park. 1000 feet is insufficient to encircle the balance of the park. Though it was not certain that the State Highway Authority would approve the installation of wooden railroad ties in place of the required metal fencing, County officials believed that wooden ties would be approved. In the event metal were approved, the Association recommended brown metal.

Three residents who live on the south side of Curtis, west of Marshall Street expressed strong objections to any sort of fencing on their portion of road because it would hamper access/egress to their driveways. Jacob countered that the barricade would be placed at least four feet from the road's edge. Ida Goodwin moved and Cynthia Porter seconded a motion to place no barricade on the south side of Curtis from Marshall west to Woodlawn. The motion failed 8-6. Jacob Goodwin then moved and Mile Ann seconded a motion to encircle Curtis Parkway on the north and south sides from Marshall Street west to Woodlawn Avenue. Sandy Myers asked for a withdrawal of the motion to allow further study. Neither Jacob nor Mile agreed. The vote was tied 10 to 10. The vote of the chair was yea and the motion carried. For the record, those voting in favor were members in good standing. Their names and as follows: David Braun, Mile Ann, Judith and Richard Livingston, Gary Kojek, Wendy Kupnick, Beth and Jeff Bleeker, Catherine Rossbach, Jacob Goodwin and Marianne Giebel.

Jacob was instructed to notify Jim Scott's office of the meeting of the results of the meeting. He was asked to advise the County of potential problems with homeowner drives.

The membership was notified by Marianne Giebel that she was proceeding with plans to draw up a telephone directory. She anticipated its release in early summer and solicited volunteer help.

Marianne Giebel notified members that signs on Cavalin Trail posting a hearing on the closing of the trail were erroneously placed by the County. No hearing is planned.

Marianne Giebel told members of a scheduled hearing concerning the construction of a workshop on the property at 2842 Summerfield. Any interested resident should consult the sign in front of the property.

The final item of business was the election of officers for the 1983-84 fiscal year. Mile Ann read the election slate. The slate, as printed in the April '83 "DOWNS" was amended to nominate Henry Rodriguez as Vice President and Marianne Giebel as Recording Secretary. The slate passed unanimously.

With no further business the meeting was adjourned at 9:45 p.m.

held September 7, 1983

Jacob Goodwin called the meeting to order. The minutes of the May 20th meeting were read and accepted. A Treasurer's report indicated the Association has on hand \$1048.47 as of the end of the fiscal year 6/30/83.

A report was given by Membership Chairman, Marion Bill. She reported that \$802.50 plus a \$5.00 donation was collected in the spring '83 drive. Approximately 75% of the households joined, accounting for 320 members. Hospitality Chairman Mary Millsbach will continue on as chairman for the coming year.

The first matter of unfinished business concerned speeders on Summifield Road. Beth Bleeker reported that a petition with 10 signatures was presented to the police. Lt. Parapo contacted Beth and verified 24 speeding violations on Summifield from 1/83 - 7/10/84. He added that that constituted more violations than on any other street. Because there are limited speed limit signs posted, prosecution was difficult to make stick. Parapo was approaching the state for additional signs. No response has been heard since July '83. Beth solicited further support from the Association through an article in the Dows to a possible petition to state representatives or petition to the County to assume responsibility for roads in Beemer Dows after improvements on road.

The next item reviewed was barricades on Curtis and the lot lot construction. Jacob will engine if construction is complete, if anything can be done about motorbikes and standing water outside the playing area and a paved trail (or adjoining road). Henry Rodriguez, ~~and Marion~~ should be go to draft a letter to the city

for Masterbrook for his support on the park. The motion passed unanimously. Henry volunteered to draft a letter.

The issue of Barnhardt remains with Jim Scott. Jacob will contact Jim Scott to see what action has been taken.

On the issue of road improvements, it was reported that easements for the next phase are still being pursued. Construction is scheduled for spring. Randy Magnus will remain as Roads Committee Chairwoman.

Regarding the issue of annexation, Beth and Marianne volunteered to initiate study of that possibility of incorporation into the City of Falls Church. The plan of action is 3 phased: 1. Research procedures and desirability of annexation. 2. Survey community's position. 3. If yes to phase 2, approach Falls Church officials.

The first item of new business was a proposal by Marty Hovers to have a park clean-up in November.

Jacob Goodwin brought up the issue of the Association sponsoring a form of Cable TV - its advantages and disadvantages, rates, etc. Marianne moved that the Association not promote, advertise or endorse media/journal unless they have something unique for Braddock Dams. The motion carried 8-0.

Discussion of the bypass moth issue was deferred until the next meeting.

Randy Magnus motioned, and Henry seconded that notice for the Association to renew its membership in the Federation. The dues will be \$30. The motion passed unanimously.

A ~~move~~ motion was made by Henry to give the recording secretary the authority to sign checks for the Assn. After a second by Suee the motion passed unanimously. Randy Magnus recommended that change be reflected in the by-laws.

Jacob Goodwin spoke of being approached by a resident on Chestnut on the matter of the Association expanding its boundaries to include that street. Henry moved that Jacob contact the man stating our community of interest and welcoming any ~~petition~~ petition by ~~the~~ Chestnut residents. Randy seconded the motion. It passed unanimously.

Jim Paul was instructed to distribute the first Doms to the first week of every month.

Marianne first brought up the issue of the new directory and requested authority to pay for the booklet. The total

bill should be in excess of \$175. Henry moved and Susan seconded that the president authorize the corresponding secretary to call a general meeting of the Assn by phone to authorize payment of the printing bill. It passed unanimously.

[Marion Gish did call such a meeting. Those in favor included the attending board, Catherine Rossback and Celia Reich.]

Jacob Goodwin mentioned that the Association by-laws needed updating. He volunteered to meet with Dennis, the attorney, and compile a list of suggestions.

Susan & Marcy Powers volunteered to audit the Treasurer's books for the fiscal year ending 6/30/83.

Jacob asked all board members to make suggestions at a later meeting of business they wished the Assn. to accomplish this year.

The second Tuesday of each month was set aside for Board meetings. The first meeting was set for Oct. 11, 1983 at 8:00.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:50 p.m.

Minutes for GUCA Meetings 10/11/83

The Meeting was called to order at 8:12 P.M. Present were J. Goodwin, B. Bleaken, S. Howlett, R. Myers, G. Moore, M. Arm, H. Rodriguez, J. Gaul, E. Reich, R. Livingston.

Minutes were read by Beth for Marianne and accepted as is.

Richard Livingston gave the board a brief introduction about himself, and was unanimously elected to fill the remaining 2 years of the term vacated by Janet Ice.

Jacob made a plea that the board follow parliamentary procedure.

El Reich gave the treasurer's report (enclosed). The board has a balance of \$784.27. The treasurer's report was accepted as is.

Old Business -

Randy gave the board an update on the neighborhood improvement project. Changes were made to the original plans for Cameron and George Mason to include less land needed for easements. This is based on the experience gained from the construction on Greenway. The revised plans also called for cutting off more of the top of hills than originally planned. Work is currently scheduled to begin in the Spring. There is also a problem with Woodlawn as far as the medium strip is concerned. This may cause a delay in the approval process. An article will be placed in the next issue of the DOWNS for persons with any physical property changes to contact Patti Ronsevel. Randy said he would try to find block captains for Woodlawn and Custis Parkway.

Jacob reported on a meeting that he and Marianne had with Patti regarding the barriers along Custis Parkway. The upshot of the meeting was that if there are no road improvements to Custis Parkway, then there is no need for barriers. If there are improvements, then the street MUST meet state standards. State standards dictate that metal barriers must be provided. Jacob talked with Donald Kiehl and found him very aware of the situation in Greenway Downs, but appeared to be unmovable on the issue of barriers. Jacob then proposed that we let the residents on Custis vote on the road improvements without regard to the barrier issue. If the vote is positive then see about blocking the metal barriers with wood. Discussion then ensued as to whether to bring up the barrier issue at the Custis presentation. Patti is against this.

Randy motioned that if Patti does not make the barrier issue known, we insist that Patti's office do it. Mike second. Motion was amended to have Patti notify the residents. Motion was passed unanimously. Mike motioned to defer discussion on the wood facing on the barriers, seconded by Gary, passed unanimously. Jacob suggested that we keep the issue in mind.

- Burial Mound -

Discussion ensued about the "burial mound" at the foot of Greenway. Some people thought that it was an eyesore. The mound as it appears does add to the plan. Beth motioned that we ask the State to present alternatives to the barricade. Gary second. Passed 9-1.

- Annexation -

Marianne and Beth have made some preliminary exploration into the possibility that Greenway Downs be annexed by the City of Falls Church. A moratorium was passed by the State in 1977 prohibiting annexation by Falls Church, Arlington and Fairfax. Boundary adjustments are permitted as a way to set around annexation. Falls Church City has in the past initiated some discussions with Fairfax County about annexations in general. Beth will continue to pursue the issue as a private citizen, not as a member of the Association board. Jacob extended his thanks, and cautioned her to pursue the issue on a low key. *Jacob app'td. Richard Livingston to aid Beth & Marianne.*

Elsbeth Braun from Marshall St. gave a presentation on the tot lot dedication/Halloween party scheduled for October 30. Discussion ensued as to whether to allocate association funds for the party, and how much. No one was quite sure as to the maximum amount the association could spend without a general meeting so Mike motioned that we allocate up to the maximum allowed in the bylaws (Pending verification) for the party. Henry seconded, passed unanimously.

Jacob presented a long list of possible invitees to the party. Discussion ensued about the political ramifications of inviting people like Brault and McDermitt. Henry motioned that we invite only those persons who had a direct affect on the tot lot. Seconded by Mike. Passed 6-2.

Motion was made by Jacob to approve a specific list of speakers. They are Herrity, Scott, Rounseval, and Kiehl, as well as present Mastenbrook with a Certificate of Appreciation. Seconded by Susan. Passed unanimously. Henry will set the certificate.

A discussion of ordinance violations was postponed.

Jacob has not yet contacted the lawyer about by-law changes.

Rends motioned that we write a letter to Scott asking the county to include Marshall and Summerfield in the commuter traffic study. Seconded by Jim Gaul. Passed unanimously.

Meeting adjourned at 10:40 P.M. Next meeting at Henry's house, Tuesday November 1.

A FEW FACTS ON PORNOGRAPHY

- * A study done by the Michigan state police shows that in two-thirds of all sexual-related crimes, the perpetrator either had pornographic materials on his person or had just read pornography.
 - * In a study of rapists in Southern California, Dr. Michael Goldstein found that 57% of the study group of sex offenders admitted to actually trying out sexual activity they had seen during exposure to pornography. Of a group of molesters of children, 87% indicated that pornography had stimulated them to commit sexual acts with the children.
 - * Law enforcement officials estimate that as many as one million youngsters (ranging from 16 to under a year) are sexually molested and then filmed or photographed, either for the abuser's own pleasure or for a profit. Many of the young victims are never identified and are subjected to every form of sadism and bestiality. One magazine, Baby Sex, shows six-month old infants in sexual acts with adults. (Ladies' Home Journal 4/83 "A Special Report on Child Pornography".)
 - * Nationwide, an estimated 50,000 children a year disappear and are never accounted for. Many of those youngsters are forced into lives of sexual exploitation, investigators said. (New York Daily News 3/27/83.)
- EXAMPLES of Playboy magazines that are being sold in local stores:
- * A full-color cartoon of a woman being sexually ravaged by a dog. (From the 25th anniversary edition.)
 - * A cartoon of Santa Claus having sexual intercourse with one of the reindeer. (From the 25th anniversary edition.)
 - * Full page cartoon of a high school boy having intercourse with his teacher on her desk. (From the April 1982 edition.)
- * High Society magazine is publishing a phone number that gives a different pornographic phone message daily. They receive 500,000 calls a day and many of the callers are young children. (Forbes magazine 3/28/83.)
 - * Male readers of skin magazines have shown the effects of pornography on their minds by involving their wives and girl friends in producing pornographic material. One magazine claims to receive 65,000 pictures of nude wives and girl friends each year, many of them too lurid to be printed even in its filthy publication. "Pornography - The Polluting of America" - James Robison.
 - * Dr. Victor Cline, a clinical psychologist who did the psychological assessments on two survivors of the infamous Houston sex murders, has noted that many studies show that when pornography spreads into a community unchallenged it brings a number of other social ills along with it. Prostitution, drugs, homosexuality, sex-related crimes such as rape and incest, and all manner of social problems seem to be pornography's fellow travelers.

Set forth below are comments made by Ms. Anderson.

In residential communities, the zoning problems are mainly caused by what your next door neighbor does which affects you.

b. Party given 21 days to comply or can car

No non-resident cars allowed.

2. Number of residents in one house - 1 family
 - a. Family defined = 4 unrelated adults or any number of related adults + children plus up to 2 boarders.

3. Barking Dogs

- at lots 7-10,000 sq' (most of Greenway Dunes)
limited to 2 dogs, inside or out.

Regarding Block Captains for the Neighborhood Improvement Program, Jacob announced that Janet Lee remain Captain for Woodlawn, Debby and Norman Sowers volunteered for Sunnyside and there is no captain as yet for Crestie. Randy will notify ~~of the captain~~ Patti Rousenell of the new captains.

Discussion was directed to the issue of a possible incorporation of Greenway Downs into Falls Church City. The issue as the board saw it was not one of equity. The Annexation committee was directed to approach the City's manager to determine their level of interest in the issue.

Marty Sowers is planning a Fall Clean Up Dec. 3rd, Sat. 10:00 with a rain date of Dec. 4th at 11:00. Bags will be provided and Randy Myers offered his van for hauling the trash.
