Per your request, we are forwarding a written statement of the agreement reached with your assistance at our meeting in Mr. Scott's office on July 29, 1982.

#### We request:

- That each of the three block sections of Cavalier Trail between Cameron Road and Marshall Street be posted: "No Motorized Vehicles" and "Closed at Dusk." That the police be asked to assist the community in providing enforcement for these provisions.
- 2. That the Trail remain open on a trial basis, following construction of the storm drain. We agree, in good faith, to present to the Board of Supervisors one or more recommendations regarding the future of the Trail by May 30, 1983, or two month's before the end of the construction contract, whichever comes later.
- 3. That further action on this matter by the Board of Supervisors be deferred until the conclusion of this trial period.
- 4. That the county police department continue to assist the community in monitoring complaints in relation to the Trail during the trial period.
- 5. We would request that the county ask the Contractor to delay restoration of the trail until the latest date possible under the contract.

In addition, all of the parties have agreed to work for the establishment of an effective "Neighborhood Watch" in our community as soon as possible. The parties agree that if the "Neighborhood Watch" program is not viable, that the trail should be closed.

We appreciate your concern and assistance in this matter.

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Two issues are of critical importance to the County as the year comes to a close -- cable television franchising and the upcoming session of the Virginia General Assembly. Both will be topics of our December meeting.

CABLE TELEVISION: For some time now the County Board of Supervisors has been considering the mechanism for licensing and regulating cable television franchises in the County. Because the County offers such a potentially lucrative cable television market, and because the possible franchise fees the County could impose on a successful applicant could be a significant source of revenue in years to come, the process of deciding how to proceed in this area has been very slow.

But the time has been well spent. In the past year the Federation and other groups and individuals have urged various measures to protect citizens' rights in the franchising process. The Board of Supervisors has been responsive to these suggestions, most recently adopting strict conflict of interest disclosure requirements which had been endorsed by the Federation. As a result of this cautious approach the County's cable television ordinance now on the books is much better than the version first proposed.

To bring us up to date on the cable plans, and to outline the steps now to be taken in soliciting and awarding franchises, Bill Rossi, the County's cable television administrator, will make a presentation following our business meeting. The business meeting will start at 8:15 p.m. and the Cable TV presentation will begin at 9:30 p.m.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY: The January session of the state General Assembly will be considering several bills critical to the County. The most important of these is a measure which would, if passed, allow the County to finance through bonds, general revenues or revenue sharing funds the construction of roads within the County.

We have already recognized the fact that our inadequate transportation system, particularly roads, is the major problem facing the County. Gaining the authority to finance construction of our own roads, rather than continuing to rely on the inadequate financial support offered by the Virginia Department of Highways and Transportation, could be an important step in solving our transportation troubles.

Most important, it is a very serious step which demands careful consideration. A resolution basically supporting the measure, with the additional suggestion for establishing road construction priorities, has been passed by the Federation Board of Directors and appears in this <u>Bulletin</u> (page 4) for general membership action. Other critical General Assembly issues being brought before the membership on December 18th include raising the legal minimum age for purchasing alcohol, and elected school board, and repeal of the school board tie-breaker provision. Resolutions on these items also appear elsewhere in the <u>Bulletin</u>.

I urge your attendance at 8:15 p.m. on Thursday the 18th in Conference Rooms D and E.

# RESOLUTION ON COUNTYWIDE TRANSPORTATION LEGISLATION AND PRIORITIES

#### Background:

A serious problem facing Fairfax County is the failure of the roads system to meet present and future traffic demands. Currently, the Virginia Department of Highways and Transportation (VDH&T) constructs and maintains roads within the County, allocating its resources for projects according to a complicated statewide formula. However, it has become apparent in recent years that the present and anticipated funding levels for road construction and improvement by the VDH&T within Fairfax County will not meet needs.

#### Resolution:

- 1. WHEREAS, Fairfax County is currently served by an inadequate system of roads that is a threat to the safety of County residents and a detriment to the orderly development of the County; and,
- 2. WHEREAS, the current funding allocation formula for road construction of VDH&T does not keep pace with the growing needs for new roads and road improvements in Fairfax County; and,
- 3. WHEREAS, it has become increasingly apparent that the present and anticipated levels of highway construction and maintenance funding from VDH&T for projects within Fairfax County fail, and will continue to fail, to match needs; and,
- 4. WHEREAS, the issue of transportation, particularly highway construction and maintenance has been determined by the County Committee on City Status to be the most important issue facing the County today; and,
- 5. WHEREAS, the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors has established local funding participation in County highway construction and improvement to be the most pressing issue to be presented to the 1981 session of the General Assembly; and,
- 6. WHEREAS, limited resources and increasing needs dictate that priorities for road construction and improvement projects be set by a predictable measure of the realtive urgency of the projects;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations (FCFCA) urges the General Assembly to pass legislation which would allow the County to construct new highways and improve existing ones, and which would provide that such roads would be built to State standards and maintained by the State; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the FCFCA supports the Board of Supervisors in its request for authority to issue bonds for road construction in Fairfax County; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the FCFCA urges the Board of Supervisors to establish objective criteria for setting of priorities for all road projects; and,

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the FCFCA urges the Board of Supervisors to appoint a County Transportation Commission:

- A) That shall recommend to the Board of Supervisors a set of objective criteria. This weighted point system shall include but not be limited to:
  - 1. Safety
    - dangerous intersections corrected
    - sight distances improved
  - 2. High traffic volume
    - bottlenecks alleviated
    - spot improvements to accommodate peak loads (signs, lights, turn lanes, merging lanes)
  - 3. Access to Metro stations
  - 4. Access to employment centers
    - revitalization of older commercial areas
    - new developments
- B) That shall hold public hearings to help determine their recommendations to the Board of priorities for primary and secondary road projects and/or spot improvements, according to adopted criteria.
- C) That shall monitor regional, state and federal transportation programs as they apply to Fairfax County, to ensure coordination for the most effective use of limited resources.

# RESOLUTION ON RAISING THE LEGAL MINIMUM AGE FOR PURCHASING ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES.

#### Background:

Under current state law, the legal minimum age for purchasing beer is 18, and for purchasing wine and spirits, 21. In the past four sessions of the General Assembly, measures to raise the minimum age for beer to 19 or 20 were defeated; however, in the past session two bills, HB 188, which would raise the minimum to 19 and HB 189, which would raise the minimum age to 20, were carried over and will be presented at the 1981 session. Both bills are sponsored by Fairfax County Delegate Warren E. Barry (R.-19).

#### Resolution:

- 1. WHEREAS, two House of Delegates bills which would, if signed into law, raise the legal minimum age for purchasing alcoholic beverages were carried over from the 1980 session of the General Assembly; and,
- 2. WHEREAS, HB 188 would raise the minimum legal age from 18 to 19; and,
- 3. WHEREAS, HB 189 would raise the minimum legal age from 18 to 20; and,
- 4. WHEREAS, the intent of both bills to make it more difficult for older high school students (age 18) to purchase such beverages and distribute to other, younger students; and,
- 5. WHEREAS, the intent of state legislation establishing a minimum legal age for the purchase of alcoholic beverages is being thwarted by such practices; and,
- 6. WHEREAS, the consumption of alcoholic beverages within Fairfax County high schools generates health, safety, discipline and education problems;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations (FCFCA) endorses passage of HB 189, which would raise the minimum legal age for purchase of alcoholic beverages from 18 to 20; and,

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that, failing passage for HB 189, the FCFCA endorses passage of HB 188, which would raise the legal minimum age for purchasing alcoholic beverages from 18 to 19.

#### RESOLUTION ON REPEAL OF THE SCHOOL BOARD TIE-BREAKER PROVISION

#### Background:

The 1980 General Assembly revised the state code pertaining to public schools and instituted a requirement that local governing bodies appoint a school board tie-breaker. In accordance with the law, the Board of Supervisors this year appointed a tie-breaker, although both the Supervisors and the School Board (as well as the tie-breaker appointed) oppose this new requirement. In its annual package to the General Assembly, the Board of Supervisors is requesting legislation to repeal this provision of the state law requiring appointment of a tie-breaker.

#### Resolution:

- 1. WHEREAS, a 1980 state law requires the appointment of a tie-breaker to the Fairfax County School Board; and,
- 2. WHEREAS, in compliance with that law, the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors has appointed a School Board tie-breaker; and,
- 3. WHEREAS, there exists an overwhelming opinion both on the Board of Supervisors and on the Fairfax County School Board that appointed tie-breakers are not necessary for the proper and timely conduct of the County school system; and,
- 4. WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors plans to seek legislation in the 1981 session of the General Assembly repealing the requirement for a tie-breaker;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations (FCFCA) finds no useful purpose for appointment of a tie-breaker for the Fairfax County School Board; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the FCFCA is concerned that a tie-breaker is in an awkward position of having to keep current and knowledgeable on all issues before the School Board in order to cast only an occasional vote; and,

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the FCFCA urges repeal of the state code provision requiring appointment of a tie-breaker for the Fairfax County School Board.

#### RESOLUTION ON AN ELECTED SCHOOL BOARD FOR FAIRFAX COUNTY

#### Background:

Under current Virginia law, all school boards in counties are appointed by the Board of Supervisors. The issue of legislation allowing, or requiring, an elected school board in counties has been before the General Assembly in every session since the early 1950s. The primary argument for an elected school board is that citizens should have direct ballot recourse to those setting public school policy, particularly since local expenditures for public schools are a major part of the County budget. Arguments against an elected school board are that educational matters and policies should be shielded from politics, the present system allows for voter recourse through elected supervisors, and an elected school board without fiscal autonomy (which the General Assembly appears unlikely to grant) would be a disruptive element in local government and unworkable because it would be ultimately obligated to the Board of Supervisors for revenues. While the debate on the merits continues, a bill (HB 269) to provide for a referendum on the issue of elected school boards in Fairfax County has been carried over from the 1980 session of the General Assembly and will be considered in 1981.

#### Resolution:

1. WHEREAS, HB 269 would provide for a popular referendum within Fairfax County on the issue of establishing an elected school board; and,

WHEREAS, HB 366 and HB 841 are related measures which would provide for popular electon of members of the Fairfax County School Board, should such a referendum question win the approval of a majority of County voters; and,

- 3. WHEREAS, the Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Association (FCFCA) believes that the basic premise of orderly local government is that the ultimate fiscal responsibility or public funds rests in elected bodies; and,
- 4. WHEREAS, no bill now before the General Assembly provides for fiscal autonomy for elected school boards;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the FCFCA opposes, in principle, the establishment of an elected body which does not have fiscal autonomy; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the FCFCA opposes, in principle, the establishment of governing bodies within the same local jurisdiction with conflicting and/or overlapping fiscal authority; and,

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the FCFCA urges defeat of HB 269, which would provide for a popular referendum on establishment of an elected school board without fiscal autonomy; and the FCFCA urges defeat of HB 366 and HB 841, both of which would provide for the election of a school board by popular vote, should such a referendum be approved.

Dear Greenway Downs Resident:

I appreciated your communication in regard to the question of whether the Board of Supervisors should take action to close the portion of Cavalier Trail between Cameron Road and Marshall Street. I apologize for responding to you with this form letter, but the people interested in this issue were too numerous for me to reply to them individually.

As you know, the Board of Supervisors held a public hearing on the matter on July 26. Both sides were well represented at the public hearing. After the hearing, Chairman Herrity and I met with representatives of both sides to determine if a compromise solution of some kind might be found. The final result of that meeting is attached. It is an agreement which has been signed by a representative of those who wish to see Cavalier Trail closed and a representative of those who wish to see it kept open.

Essentially, the agreement states that:

- (1) Cavalier Trail should be kept open for a period of approximately 10 months:
- (2) During that period of time, efforts will be made by the community and the County to reduce the causes of the requests for closure, including an effort to initiate a Neighborhood Watch program. If the program is not viable, the memorandum states that the trail should be closed.

I am hopeful that this agreement and the trial period will lead to a consensus solution to the matter.
