In 1942, the Greenway Downs Citizens Association was formed "to protect and promote the interest of the citizenry; to foster friendly and cooperative 'esprit de corps' among the freeholders and residents; and to maintain cordial relations and collective action with all agencies-local, county, state and federal, and any other groups or organizations having as their purpose the promotion of public welfare."

This year, GDCA saw a record turnout of both adults and children at the annual Halloween Parade. GDCA Takes Street Concerns to Connolly

In recent years, speeding has become a big issue in The Downs. In particular, Summerfield Road has become a cut-through between Routes 29 & 50.

After meeting with GDCA members, Supervisor Connolly entered Summerfield Road in the county's Traffic Calming Program. A study was concluded early this month and results will be released at the annual meeting in May. Meeting details will be published in the next issue of *The DOWNS*.

Walking is a great activity, but for safety's sake, please stay on sidewalks, where provided. On streets with steep inclines and heavy traffic, such as Summerfield and Marshall, walking in the street is especially dangerous.

Health and Future of the Creek Are In Our Hands

pril 20 is our annual park clean-up and this year there's as much work as ever! You may not have paid much attention to our creek, but if you're ever around a really healthy creek, you'll see an astounding difference.

Healthy creeks teem with life. You see all kinds of fish, frogs, turtles, salamanders, birds, and dragonflies. In a less healthy system, like the one we have now in Greenway Downs, you see much less wildlife, and usually a lot of trash.

Creeks are part of larger water systems called watersheds, and they're a great indicator of how healthy a watershed is. Our creek is actually part of a system of storm sewers that extend west on Lee Highway. Our stretch is the first part that is not in a cement channel. Because the openings are near commercial enterprises, a lot of what we see in the creek is actually from dumpsters and the curbs and sidewalks along Lee Highway. We've frequently taken from our creek artificial flowers that have blown into storm sewers near the cemetery.

On April 20, we'll meet at the basketball court at 10 a.m. to clean up our park and creek. We'll work as long as there's something to do, but probably no later than 12:30. Be sure to bring pruners, rakes and saws labeled with your name, work gloves, and—if you're willing—boots or old sneakers to wear in the creek. Trash bags will be provided.

Even if you can't come to the clean-up, there are simple things you can do any day to improve the health of our creek. For example, when you see trash in the creek or on the street, pick it up. The number one item removed from our creek is the useful and ubiquitous plastic grocery bag.

If your kids make a dam in the creek, knock it down when they're finished playing. Moving water is healthy water. And always wash your hands and feet after playing or working in the creek—virtually every water course in Virginia harbors E. Coli bacteria.

Clean-up after your dog and resist the urge to toss that bag of doo-doo in the creek. It sounds obvious, but it's a problem in our creek. Bring an extra bag when you walk your dog, so you can offer it to another dog owner in need.

Finally, if you fertilize your lawn, consider using organic fertilizers. And never overfertilize—it all goes into the ground water. The future of the Greenway Downs creek is in our hands. We can keep it a beautiful, healthy asset to our community, or we can

run the risk that the county will decide to pave it as just another storm drain. The choice is truly up to us.

Committee Gets Set to Welcome New Neighbors


The welcoming committee has been busy the past few months assembling Welcome Packets for our new neighbors.

Holiday Events Draw Record Turn-out; Collect Bountiful Harvest for Area's Needy



In December, scores of Greenway Downs residents participated in the neighborhood's holiday events. The fun and great holiday spirit these events inspired can still be felt in the neighborhood.

The Holiday House Decorating Contest

The holiday season began with the introduction of the GDCA Holiday Home Decorating Contest, with prizes provided by very special and generous local retailers (See listing on page 4).

Votes were gathered from members of the GDCA, the Neighborhood Watch, and residents who made e-mail and phone recommendations. Recommendations were also made on Sunday, December 16th by the Caroling for Cans revelers as they walked throughout the Greenway Downs area singing and collecting donations for the Falls Church Community Services Food Pantry. The homes were judged in three categories.

The prize for Most Festive, was awarded to John and Cathy Thatcher of 2753 Woodlawn Avenue for best use of color/most flamboyant display. The Thatchers, who have lived in their home for just over three years, used many, many strings of oversized lights to surround their fence and home. They also displayed objects on the house and lawn, and poinsettias in baskets along the fence.

"This year, we actually toned down our holiday house decorating," the Thatchers said. "In light of Sept. 11 and the war, it didn't really feel like Christmas, but we tried to get more into the spirit by decorating.

"Personally, we really like the big, old-fashioned lights; not only for nostalgia, but because they are so festive and pretty even when unplugged—making color night and day. We really enjoy decorating our house and yard and hope to outdo ourselves next year!

For Most Creative Salvador and Dora Corral of 2830 Summerfield Road decorated with an abundance of lights, color and holiday displays—including a large tree FULL of hanging decorations and Santa Claus wearing a sombrero—to win the award for most original and unusual holiday display.

"We have lived in this house for 12 years, but this is our first Christmas we have spent here," the Corrals said. "We decorated with lots of color and a manger scene, as is traditional in our home country. We want to thank the neighborhood for the honor of winning and the presents they have given us.
