ABOUT OUR SPEAKER

After 15 years of requests to the County, Greenway Downs has accomplished its major task of getting adequate (we hope) drainage for the creek along Custis Parkway. Now it is time to turn our sights to another serious drainage problem—gutters along our humpback roads.

Our guest speaker for December is Mr. John E. Behrend, Director of the Administration Division, Department of Public Works. Mr. Behrend is to speak to us about the problems and costs associated with building curbs and gutters in our area. His experience with a similar though larger project in Pimmit Hills will help us decide whether we wish to pursue such a project here.

Mr. Behrend, who was born in Washington, D. C., has been a resident of Virginia for 22 years. He attended the University of Virginia and worked for Holland Engineering of Alexandria for 15 years. He has been with Fairfax County for 2½ years. He is a member of the American Public Works Association: Institute of Municipal Engineering—Institute of Solid Waste; Regional Sanitary Advisory Board, C.O.G.; Illuminating Engineering Society; Board of Zoning Appeals, City of Fairfax; and the Lamplighters (Roadway Lighting Forum). In his "spare time" he is Scoutmaster to Boy Scout Troop 973, Fairfax, Virginia.
