# LETTER FROM SUPERVISOR JIM SCOTT

Dear Providence District Resident:

I invite you to a meeting to discuss the status of the PLUS program and to initiate citizen task force organizations for the purpose of reviewing district master plans.

On April 18, 1974 at 7:45 P.M. in the Falls Church High School there will be a short progress report on PLUS by the county staff, followed by small group meetings to discuss the formulation of task forces to make recommendations on the new land use plans to be prepared during the PLUS program. After the initial discussion we shall divide the group into committees according to the planning district in which each person resides. (Greenway Downs is in Jefferson).

Many people have already indicated a specific interest in certain of the functional areas: transportation, housing, environment, economics, public facilities, zoning and land use. Each of the planning district task forces may want to organize sub-committees along these functional lines so I encourage you to give some thought to which area interests you most.

During the small group meetings, each group will have a chance to discuss problems and issues in their planning district. Each group will be encouraged to set its own meeting times and establish its own rules for reviewing the district plans. I shall ask several people to serve as chairmen of the task forces.

Thank you very much for your continued interest and assistance. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to give me a call.

# IRENE T. SMITH - OUTSTANDING CITIZEN

Irene Smith was born in Washington, D.C., attended public schools there. and married a childhood sweetheart one month after graduating from high school. A few years later, in June of 1949, the couple, with three young children, moved to Greenway Downs, into a home which they literally built themselves, with a minimum of professional help! They did engage a bulldozer, with operator, to excavate a basement, and licensed craftsmen for the electrical wiring, heating, and plumbing--but the foundation, exterior framing, scaffolding, and interior construction and finishing was done by the two of them, with the help of two neighboring families who were also building their own homes. This is how they spent all of their free time, with three youngsters running around, yet!

There is a reason for detailing so much of this homebuilding project. It indicates clearly the type of person being honored. The same kind of stick-to-itiveness has carried over into other situations -- school, church, and community endeavors.

After assisting her husband in the formation of an area recreation program, and in efforts to establish a volunteer fire department nearby, Irene Smith undertook to publish a trial issue of the community bulletin which became known as THE DOWNS, led drives for the original cover design, and for the one now used, and became the principal editor during 1963, 64, 65, 66, part of 1967, and again for another year which ended last June. Similar efforts resulted in the publication of the first Greenway Downs Directory in 1965.

It was *Irene* who first suggested that a back-stop be built in our Park so that the kids could still play ball, and the grown-ups still have some glass left in their windows — both cars and homes! And it was *Irene* who made the new suit which the Greenway Downs Santa Claus wore for Christmas in 1966!

Irene served as a member of the Association's Executive Board for two years — the Nominating Committee for two years — and the By-Laws Revision Committee in 1968. She has held office as Recording Secretary, Vice President, and the only woman President of the Association to date.

During her term as President, members were provided with information and guest speakers on a wide variety of matters important to them: Drainage Improvement, Vandalism in the Community, Open-Housing Legislation, Interest Charges on Credit Buying, State Aid to Hearing-Impaired Children, Curbs and Gutters, and Development of Our Park.

Irene and her husband, Talma, have three children (Nancy, Curtis and Roy) and five grandchildren. Irene was a Girl Scout Leader during the time their daughter was involved. She has always been interested and active in church work, and has been Secretary of her church and also Librarian in its reading room. She loves to sew—does a lot of sewing for her grand—daughters—and, according to her husband, "She's a good cook!"

After living on Greenway Boulevard for twenty-five years, the *Smith*'s now reside in Harper's Ferry, West Virginia.

It is with great pleasure -- and with sincere thanks for a decade and a half of time and effort on behalf of the residents of this community, that we honor with the Greenway Downs OUTSTANDING CITIZEN AWARD, IRENE SMITH.


