OUTSTANDING CITIZEN FOR 1975 Joseph J. Goodwin

In grateful thanks for the many years he has given to us, we the Greenway Downs Citizens Association wish to cite Joseph J. Goodwin as our Outstanding Citizen for 1975. Not only has Joe given service as President, Vice President, and delegate to the Fairfax County Federation of Civic Associations, he has chaired the Picnic, Christmas Party, and the Nominations Committee, and has provided a sympathetic shoulder for our youth during the years he lived here.

Joe arrived at Greenway Downs with his parents and sister in 1942, after a long trip from Kentucky. Falls Church was then called "the village" and it was safe enough for Joe's sister to roller skate along Lee Highway. In those days Joe had an evening paper route on which he was accompanied by his dog, Sport.

After serving in the U.S. Marines during World War II, he joined the reserves and was soon recalled to the Korean Conflict. After Korea, he came home and married JoAnn. They lived in Greenway Downs, first with his parents, then in an apartment, and finally in their first home where they lived until last summer. (Cont'd p. 2)

About 1966 Joe began his civic work in earnest, becoming involved with the membership drives and serving as a Federation delegate. Joe kept the Association informed on rezonings taking place in or near our neighborhood so that we could fight to retain the residential flavor of Greenway Downs. He also helped fight a neighborhood convenience zoning beside Devonshire School at Lee Highway and Graham Road。

During his term as President (1969-1970), Custis Parkway, from Summerfield to Bolling Roads, was accepted into the state road system, Custis creek culvert was completed, the Association was kept informed and gave input into the proposed Lee Highway widening -- now completed, street lights were updated throughout the area and some new ones were installed, and even curbs and gutters were being seriously considered. The most serious problem of that year was a proposal for a Go-Go dance hall across from Devonshire School. Through the hard work of Greenway Downs in its support of the Devonshire PTA, this proposed use of the building was blocked.

In spite of the tremendous success of his years of service, it was Joe's caring and working with our youth that we remember most. Like a Pied Piper, he drew kids around him. His was always a sympathetic ear, whether it was car trouble, parents, or school, or just
