OUTSTANDING CITIZEN

L. RAY SMART

Mr. L. Ray Smart was named "Outstanding Citizen" of Greenway Downs at our second annual Outstanding Citizen Appreciation Award Night and covered dish dinner, February 24.

In presenting the silver brandy snifter to Mr. Smart, Mr. Thomas Thomsen cited Mr. Smart's continuous service to the community since moving here in 1944. During two terms as president and 19 years on the Executive Board, Mr. Smart helped the area move from a rural outpost to part of the urban metropolitan Washington area; from an area of 50 homes or so to an area of 430 homes; and, from mud roads and septic tanks to paved streets and central sewage.

During his first term in 1950, Mr. Smart and his administration persuaded area residents to help pay for lights on the streets, negotiated for regular trash removal rather than do-it-yourself methods often employed, and began working for the Fairfax County central sewage system. During his second term in 1960, Mr. Smart worked for through streets, and a solution for a severe drainage problem along Custis Parkway.

During his work in the Downs, Mr. Smart wrote the community newsletter and arranged for a column which appeared in the late 1950's in a local weekly newspaper.

In his remarks, Mr. Smart reminded everyone that there were no local schools when he moved here and that Greenway Downs women transported cinderblock and brick to the bricklayers so that Jefferson (Oak Street) School could be built. He also remarked how nice our quarters were compared to early meetings held over a beer hall at Gibson's Station (Lee Highway and Fairfax Street), and that we've much to be proud of as an Association including being leaders in setting up the Federation of Civic Associations.

In addition to his active involvement in his community, Mr. Smart was president of Madison Elementary School PTA and later president of George Mason Jr. Sr. High PTA, and served as vice-president of the Falls Church Council of PTA's; was twice president of the Kentucky State Society and twice chairman of the Cherry Blossom Princesses Ball; and was a charter member of the Falls Church Garden Club. He, his wife, and daughter are also Kentucky Colonels.

The evening, with Charlie Reeves as chairman, ran beautifully. Mrs. Lois Owens on piano and Mr. Arne Roslund on violin played continuously during dinner. Mr. Robert Owens sang a very stirring rendition of "You'll Never Walk Alone." Mr. Henry Rodriguez won the door prize—2 tickets donated by the State Theater, and the beautiful centerpiece donated by Falls Church Florist was presented to Mrs. Smart. Mrs. Louise Henderson, Principal of Devonshire Elementary School, gave an excellent talk relating the Association's and the family's responsibility to the schools.

In addition to those mentioned above, many thanks for a lovely evening to Ben Blankenship, Thomas Thomsen, Clyde Jackson, Irene Smith, Josephine Layland, Joe and Jo Ann Goodwin, Mary Reich, Ida Roadcap, Elouisa Stokes, Paul Davis, and Henry Rodriguez.


