Our special guest this Wednesday, a member of the House of Delegates since 1968, will be The Honorable Vincent F. Callahan, Jr. One of the leaders in the House, he will give his assessment of the accomplishments and failures of the just completed session. A strong supporter of Greenway Downs in past activities, he will also field questions relating to other State legislative problems.

Please realize that our ideas, suggestions, opinions and support are vitally important to our elected representatives if we expect them to represent our interest in Richmond.

ARCHIE SANDERS RECEIVES OUTSTANDING CITIZEN AWARD

Archie Sanders, a Greenway Downs resident for almost two decades, was this year's recipient of the Outstanding Citizen Award, presented at a dinner in Devonshire School last month.

He was cited for his 15 years of service to the people of this community, starting with his forming a committee in 1955 to coordinate the cleanup of Custis Parkway and the preparation of the land for use as a park. Since then, he has served on the Roads Committee, Membership Committee, Auditing Committee, and Streets and Utilities Committee -- as Vice President and Program Chairman, and as Acting President for a portion of a year. Originally named in 1963 to be a delegate to the County Federation of Citizens Associations, he served 9 Greenway Downs presidents in that capacity for 8 consecutive years!

With a lifelong interest in scouting, his contributions in this area have been countless as Troop Committeeman, Neighborhood Commissioner, and Institutional Representative. Our Scout Troop 677 has honored him with a Certificate of Appreciation in recognition of his outstanding service to the Scout movement.

Archie and his wife, Ethel, celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1970; and Archie celebrated his 80th birthday on February 26. Congratulations, Archie!

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AUTO TAGS MUST BE BOUGHT BY MARCH 31

State license tags must be bought and placed on your vehicles by March 31. This is a change from previous years when they were good until April 15. If you already have the new type of State tags, you know what your renewal month is already. Those who do not have the new white and blue tags have to choose a month for renewal after this month.

County tags -- a decal for your windshield -- are \$15.00 now and must be displayed no later than April 16.

NEW REFUSE RULES EFFECTIVE MARCH 1

Beginning March 1, refuse will be picked up from the rear or side of the house only if it is in approved plastic bags. Such bags may be purchased from Dart or Drug Fair at a cost of less than \$2.00 for 50 bags. If you do not want to use plastic bags, you must place your cans at the curb for pickup every Wednesday.

MORE AUTUMN OLIVES

The Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation District again has available free autumn olive seedlings as well as lespediza tree seedlings. The lespediza, like the autumn olive, is a small tree which produces berries that are attractive to birds. We have ordered some of each.

As most of you know, last spring a row of these autumn olives were planted along our creek between Greenway Blvd. and Cameron Road to form a barrier between our ball field and the creek. The new autumn olives will replace those of last year's planting which subsequently were pulled out or died. The lespediza trees will be planted in small groupings wherever we feel they will look the most attractive.
