## DANGER!! DRUGS

Our January meeting on drug abuse was probably as informative and frustrating as any program the Association has had. While it pointed out the dangers, the reasons, and the legalities of drug abuse, it also pointed out that this problem is not easily handled—legally, medically, or personally.

Our special thanks go to Mr. Friedman, Dr. John Kilfeather, and Mr. Raymond Strimling who presented drug abuse from the legal, medical and personal viewpoints. While it is hard to compress the entire discussion into a few lines, the following ideas were expressed:

Too little research has been done on drugs, especially the new synthetic drugs that can be bought by prescription, sleeping pills, pep pills, diet pills. We don't know their effects on the body or mind when they are abused as they are every day. We don't know what some of the short-term effects are much less the long-term damage.

Rehabilitation of addicts through the prisons, or even through the Lexington, Ky., hospital is not working. An addict is a sick person, not necessarily a criminal. He needs to be helped, not incarcerated.

Doctors must not prescribe pills without a thorough examination. Mr. Strimling's son, who died recently of an overdose of methadone, received sleeping pills from two separate area doctors merely by walking in and asking for them.

Drug pushers are the real criminals and should be the focus of the law. Here, however, we run into the problem that most pushers are also addicts.

Addicts are often insecure people who can not function in society and, therefore, prefer to withdraw from it.

Kids and even many adults know too little about various drugs to know what they are taking and what effects various amounts will produce. Parents must be alert and not overreact if they find an addict in the family or among friends. Communication and education are still the best way to combat drug abuse. Talk with your doctor if you should discover an abuser. Try to help him for he is taking his life in his hands, legally or physically.
