THE HARPER HOUSE

Our cover design is a picture of the unusual house on Cameron Road which was converted from a barn into a home by the late Mr. Carl B. Harper and his wife. Mr. Harper died in December 1964.

Legend has it that when George Washington attended services at the nearby Falls Church Episcopal Church, where he was a Vestryman, he stabled his horse in the barn on one of the farms of his close friend and contemporary, George Mason. (Greenway Downs was once one of these farms.) Mr. & Mrs. Harper purchased the barn of this former farm in January 1934. They set about remodeling it into a home and as soon as barely habitable, they moved into it in May 1934. The barn was covered with stone cut from the quarry which is in front of the Falls Church Motel. This stone is known as Falls Church pink granite. The original walls of the barn are now the inside walls of the house. The boards are Norway pine brought from Europe in Colonial days, probably as ballast for sailing ships. The boards are 12" wide and 1" thick. The old barn was held together by wooden pegs, except for handmade nails used in the roofing. In redoing the barn, matching wood was used throughout using boards from other old buildings including a tobacco barn. The tile roof came from a dismantled mansion in Washington. There is no plaster or wallpaper in the house. 1 . . .

The house has many unusual features that are the product of Mr. Harper's inventive genius. He supervised the unique construction of the remodeling job. The downstairs area, where horses and cows were once stabled, still has the old wooden pegs on which harnesses were hung. This is now the recreation room, garage, and storage area.

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OBSERVE BURNING LAWS

All residents are reminded of the following regulations applying to the burning of trash, brush, etc.

Burning can be done only between 4 PM and WIDNIGHT, IF THE WIND IS CALM. Also, burning is permissible when there is a clear distance of at least 300 feet between the fire and woodland or material capable of spreading to woodland. The law prohibits all burning between NOW AND MAY 15 when the wind is not calm.

The Smoke Nuisance Law prohibits the burning of anything which produces obnoxious odors or smoke within 500 feet of a dwelling (that includes us all). Basically, the law is to prevent the burning of such trash as garbage, rubber products, plastic items, dog and cat litter, etc. 4.4

The haymow is the second floor living rooms and the upper part of the haymow has been transformed into a third floor for bedrooms. The huge door that originally allowed wagons to be driven into the barn has been closed. The living room has an immense fireplace with a huge 12 foot chimney of flagstone which Mr. Harper built. Behind the fireplace is a secret stairway, the door of which is made of stone and concrete in a steel frame so delicately balanced it will open with a very light touch. The marble steps lead down to the recreation room. From the living room the third floor bedrooms are reached by an unusual drawbridge stairway which originally could be raised or lowered. The swinging balcony over the living room is copied from a French chateau and is made of wood.

Mr. Harper was an MIT graduate with degrees in aeronautical engineering. He was considered a genius in his field by those who knew him. He will be awarded a Doctor of Science degree posthumously this June from his hometown college, Davis & ikins at Elkins, West Virginia. He knew, of the award at the time of his death and was very proud of the

honor.

Ho was retired from active duty in the U.S. Navy in 1930 due to injuries the man. Every part of the house in the line of duty. He flight tested the plane for Charles Lindbergh's first transtlantic flight and taught Amelia Marhart how to fly twin-engine aircraft. He was one of the country's op men in the aeronautical field,
