PERSONAL & FAMILY SURVIVAL

The Fairfax County Office of Civil
Defense now has qualified instruc-
tors available to teach the Civil
Defense Adult Education Course en-
titled "Personal and Family Surviv-
al". The course is tuition free
and is 12 hours long, consisting of
6 two-hour sessions.

The course is designed to give adult
citizens a basic understanding of
Civil Defense and the actions they
can take to fulfill their individ-
ual, family, and community respon-
sibilities for defense. It alerts
and informs one about the hazards
inherent in living in our nuclear
age and provides them with the in-
formation necessary for personal
and family protection in case of
attack.

A class will be formed as soon as

CHANGES IN STREET NAMES

changes for two streets in Greenway
Downs in the May 21 issue. They

and E. Marshall Street will be West
Marshall Street. All of our homes
will probably be given a new num-
ber as they plan to start the num-
bering at the Potomac River and
number all streets from that point.

LAST MONTH'S PROGRAM

Our speaker last month, Detective C. R. Gardner of the Juvenile Bureau, Fairfax County Police, gave us some information which was unpleasant but about which each of us as parents must assume our share of responsibility. That is, what WE MUST DO to prevent juvenile delinquency.

We heard that Fairfax County has 500-550 cases a month dealing with juvenile delinquency. Of these, a large proportion are due to vandalism. This often ends up costing us as taxpayers more money. Quite a few cases involve run-away children. The number increases at report card time. Over 50% of the crime in Fairfax County is committed by young people, almost all of whom are white.

The following 10 danger signs of a juvenile delinquent were given as a guide for all parents.

TEN EARLY SYMPTOMS OF DELINQUENCY

1. Truancy.
2. Evidence of alcoholism or drugs on the breath, needle marks on arms.
3. Cruelty to animals.
4. Sloppy appearance or dress that exaggerates sex. In boys, uncut hair. In girls, skin-tight clothing.
5. Unexplained late hours.
6. Unexplained cuts, scratches and bruises.
7. Appearance of strange articles that were not purchased.
8. Possession of unnecessary weapons.
9. Flagrant disobedience.
10. Friends he never brings home.

FEDERATION REPORT

The Federation of Citizens Associations met Thursday, May 21, and took action to urge the Supervisors to seek a referendum on an \$8 million bond issue this September to finance expansion of Fairfax Hospital and other health facilities. The \$8 million figure is \$2 million less than the former Fairfax Hospital and Health Center Commission recommended. This figure would finance expanding the hospital from 300 to 700 beds by 1970 at a cost of \$7 million. A new health department headquarters and 5 clinics to be built in the next 10 years would use the other \$1 million.

The Federation heard Mayor John C. Wood of Fairfax City and E. A. Pritchard, challenger to the office, discuss city-county problems. Both said they would not support a merger of Fairfax City with the county nor would they approve of a move to make the county a city. The problem of where and how to expand space to house the county's administrative offices was discussed. The City of Fairfax wants them to stay where they are and expand, and the county favors moving them to a location outside the city. The Federation's executive committee recommended that if no merger or annexation comes about that the county move its offices out of the City of Fairfax. A vote on this recommendation will be taken at the June meeting.
