Since writing the above I have received yours of the 18<sup>th</sup> and am sorry to say that I have not yet persuaded Hester to pay any more rent, but I am getting after him right vigorously. The tax collector wanted to attach the rent in his hands but I persuaded him not to do it as I know that would be an excuse for him to hold it up.

Now in regard to the subdivision of your property. I would suggest that you and Mr. Browning subdivide your two tracts on Horseshoe Hill together and that would make a subdivision of about 30 acres or a little more and adjoining with the property on the east one or more streets could be opened through to connect with West Falls Church and I believe that next spring will be an opportune time to put that property on the market. By joining with Mr. Browning you could lay out a more desirable and comprehensive subdivision but each would own his own property and would control and sell your own lots.

As to your farm or home place I think your suggestion of looking forward to the future is good and I will take it up with Mr. Hester and the other adjoining property owners but I do not think the time is actually ripe for operations of that kind now.

I understand the concrete is laid about up to Dr. Graham's now and the road will soon be opened to your place.
